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Executive Summary

Jaywant Mahavidyalaya is situated in Ichalkaranji in Kolhapur district, Maharashtra. It has been established on 15th September 1993 by Hon. Mr. Jayawantraoji Awale, founder president of Jayawantrao Awale Shikanshan Prasarak Mandal, Ichalkaranji. The institution renders its valuable services in the field of education to students at different levels. These include students from socio-economic and intellectually backward classes as well as the student from textile, industrial, business, agricultural areas. It's has been offering services both to the rural & urban students coming from in and around Ichalkaranji. Jaywant Mahavidyalaya is one of the branches of Jaywantrao Awale Education Propagatory Board. Since its inception the college has started Arts faculty. Commerce faculty was started in 2010-11. There is facility of P.G. Degree in English from 2008-09. The college has permanent affiliation of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. It is Grant –in-Aid College. It is recognized under 2F, 12B in 2007. The college has been accredited at C++ level in 2004. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was formed in the college as per the guidelines of NAAC in July 2004.

Criterion wise Analysis

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The institutional goals and objectives are in accordance with the academic programme taught in the college as well as the motto of the college. The curriculum in various subjects is being developed by Shivaji University, Kolhapur to which the college is affiliated. Though there is little freedom in framing syllabi, it is a matter of pride that two of our faculty members have been working as BOS member for B.A.III. In addition to it, the faculty members discuss students expectations, views etc. about respective syllabus informally during the period. Besides, faulty members give their suggestions to the university when the syllabus is open online for suggestions. Our faculty members participate & give suggestions to board of studies (BOS) of Shivaji University through various workshops concerning modified curricula. The faculty members also try to import national aims during their regular TL process.

Criterion II: Teaching Learning and Evaluation

Admission to the degree and post degree classes is being given according to the statute of Shivaji University, Kolhapur and Maharashtra Government. Though conventional class room lecture method is predominantly practiced, ICT and the modern techniques and teaching aids are also used. The institution ensures the effective TL experience by providing computer, Lap-tops with internet facility, OHP, LCD projector, CDs and DVDs. The college analyses the feedback collected on curriculum and institution in order to make SWOC analysis and improve the quality of faculty as per suggestions made by students.

The various committees of the college with the help of student's council organize various co-curricular activities for versatile personality development of students. Guest lectures are arranged for students to provide expertized knowledge. Faculty members update and enhance their knowledge in their respective subjects by participating in various universities, state, national and International level seminars, conferences etc. as well as refresher and orientation courses. Evaluation of students is done through Home-Assignments, oral tests, scanning and skimmings questions, written tests, seminars, project works etc. The performance of the students is considered minutely and slow learners are tried to improve by extra guidance & personal attention. The advanced learners are also

encouraged with providing special guidance, reference books and personal counseling.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

There is a quantum jump in research activity in the post-accreditation phase, reflected in qualitative and qualitative boost regarding faculty participation in seminar and conferences. The research committee promotes the faculty members are encouraged to enhance the research knowledge and findings. They are also motivated to avail research facilities. We are proud to mention that almost all the faculty is M. Phil degree holder and majority faculty members are Ph. D degree holders. In addition to it the majority of the faculty members participate in international/ national/ state level seminars/conference/workshops etc. Dr. S. S. Mulla is a well known writer in Marathi while Dr. S. S. Patil, Dr. M. V. Joshi, Dr. S. P. Chavan are well known writers in their subjects. Four proposals for minor research project are under consideration of UGC.

The students are also motivated for research activities like paper presentation, articles in annual magazines, quiz competitions etc.. There is group project activity for the students of third year of B.A./B.Com. Faculty.

The college organizes various extension activities in collaboration with the university, neighboring industries etc.. The NSS unit of the college is strong and their activities in the city as well as adopted village are note-worthy.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure & Learning Resources

The institution provides adequate infrastructure facilities to keep pace with the academic growth. The college is situated on the first floor of the building which is built with financial support of Siddhivinayak Nyas, Mumbai and management. The college has is spacious building with sufficient class rooms, ladies room, study room, library, gymkhana, computer room. There is a big playground and the campus of the college. The college campus is environment friendly.

The college building is optimally utilized. After the B.A./B.Com classes are being used by B.Ed. College when the classes are over. The auditorium of the college and play ground is occasionally used by community.

One common classroom is availed with LCD projector. CDs/DVDs digital camera and other e-resources are made available. Xerox machine bore well; municipality water supply connection is also made available.

The NSS unit is very active in social awareness programmes. It involved actively in the community services through various activities like tree plantation blood donation, AIDS awareness, save baby girl abhiyan, education to eradicate superstition etc.

The institution provides all the necessary as well as financial assistance to needy, poor and deserving students taking into consideration institution's goals, vision and mission. Meritorious students are encouraged with prizes. Almost 80% of the students receive financial assistance from state or central government.

ANSWER:-

The teachers receive faithful support from the university and parent institutions for procedural & practical improvement in teaching practices. In addition to it the university brings about changes in the draft of syllabi if it receives suggestions from the faculty members of the affiliated colleges. The university guides the concerned members of facility on issues like easy availability / access of the prescribed text books in the market. The university publishes rough draft of the curriculum and invites suggestions if any. The online syllabi are available on the university website.

The institution through the librarian makes the newly prescribed text books and reference books available to the staff at the earliest.

ANSWER:-

The institution has formed an academic audit committee. The committee supervises the implementation of curriculum and prepares its audit report with recommendation if any. Moreover, the head of the institution organizes time to time meetings with students' council and takes feedback orally. Student feedback is taken annually where the teaching procedure is assured by the students.

ANSWER:-

In fact the curriculum is being drafted by the university according to the guidelines of the UGC. Our institution is affiliated to the Shivaji University. As a result of it we have little freedom to give scope to the local things such as industry, research bodies etc. However, the curriculum is inclusive of basic skills. So the students are prepared to face challenges in all the fields.

Answer:-

Though we have only degree courses in our college, the college has offered certificate course in Montessori Teacher's Training Course run by

Department of Extension and Adult Education, Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The Objectives for the courses are as follows.

- 1) To uplift the economical condition of the women/girls in and around Ichalkaranji.
- 2) To avail the opportunity of Montessori Teacher's training course to women especially from the under privileged sections.
- 3) To provide platform to the women by giving them an opportunity to face all the challenges of the competitive world.
- 4) To provide an opportunity to know child psychology for proper parent guardianship.

- 4) At departmental level group projects are undertaken to cater the local needs.
- 5) NSS unit conducts various programmes.
- 6) Cultural department also organizes various programmes where institution's goals & objectives are reflected.
- 7) By the combination of goals & objectives of the institution students are upgraded through Co- curricular & extracurricular activities.

1:3:2 what are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

ANSWER :-Every subject teacher is a kind of mediator between students and the university .The subject teachers organize informal discussions with the students regarding their experiences. These views are expressed by the teachers in the workshops on revised syllabi or to the BOS members.

In addition to it the institution tries to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum provided by university for better future of students, according to the needs of the dynamic market. We provide various weekly, quarterly, monthly, biannual and annual journals and periodicals and like employment News, India today Competitive Exam, Explorer Kurushetra etc. and reference books to the students. Recently the college has availed e –resources to the students and staff. We encourage students for competitive exams & extra curriculum activities in various fields.

ANSWER :-The institution integrate the cross cutting issues such as gender, climate change ,environment education, Human Rights etc. into the curriculum in a following way .

<u>Gender</u>: We provide equal opportunities, equal treatment and equal rights to girl and boy students. The institution organizes various Programmes for the upliftment of girls through Savitribai Phule Ladies Association and Sexual Harassment Prevention Committee (ladies grievances redressal committee).

<u>Climate change</u>:- the institution tries to eradicate the difference of social classes based on economical and regional level . All students are treated equal.

<u>Environmental Education</u>: - The institution creates awareness among the students about the current issues related to environment through various programmes as well as during regular T.L process.

<u>Human Rights:</u> the institution has organized various programmes on human rights. <u>ICT</u>: The teaching and non-teaching staff makes use of ultra modern equipment in the classrooms. Students are availed of internet facility.

1:3:4: what are the various value added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

ANSWER: During the classes the moral & ethical values are inculcated by the respective teachers of the faculty. The Principal of the institution takes common meetings of the students occasionally. Then the college has NSS unit through which moral values are integrated among the students.

Better Career Options:-

The college has Career Guidance Cell and Competitive Examination Center through which better career options are provided to the students in various fields.

The faculty members organized study tours, visits to industries, sugar factories etc. .Such kind of visits and tours give an opportunity of employability and career development of the students.

Community Orientation:-

The NSS unit organizes community oriented camps each year. During such camps, we evoke various social problems like male-female ratio, agricultural issues anti-dowry, sexual harassment prevention, woman empowerment& Female–infanticides etc. The college organizes various activities like Tree Plantation, Blood Donation Camps, Environment Awareness Programmes, Water Management, voting awareness campaign etc.

ANWER:- The institution contributes in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the university. Dr. S. S. Mulla and Asst. Prof. V. V. Patil are the members of BOS in the subject of Marathi and English respectively. Prin. Dr. P. G. Patil is the member of Management Council of the university.

The faculty members give their suggestions and students experiences on the curriculum. Some of our faculty members are subject expert in sub-committee of their BOS.

ANSWER: YES. There is a special feedback committee which collects feedback from students and stockholders. The suggestions received from feedback are taken for discussion in front of the faculty members. The respective subject teachers put forward their suggestions and consult with the BOS members. The university takes into considerations such recommendations for further necessary action.

Some suggestions are put forward by subject teachers in a workshops, seminars and conferences in various subjects.

ANSWER: The institution has introduced B.Com I,II & III year degree course from 2010-11 and post degree course in English from 2008-09. These faculties are run on permanent non-grant basis. Almost all the students getting admission here are from in and around the city. However pamphlets regarding availability of the courses are circulated with newspapers.
 - d) Admission notification issued by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur is displayed on the college notice board.
 - e) Admission quota is being completed according to University statute.
 - f) The college does not give admission notifications in the news papers or through any other media for the purpose of giving wide publicity to the admission process. Without that the college gets sufficient number of

students enrolled in each course every year, as it is a good, old and reputed institution for imparting quality education in this area. Besides, the college gets helpline from students and alumni to do mouth publicity.

In addition to it the members of the admission committee and counseling committee guide and help the students in admission process . The members of these committee guides the students in the choice of subjects , code numbers , fee structure ,necessary documents to be submitted etc. .

2.2 <u>Catering to Diverse Needs of Students</u>

2:2:1 how does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

ANWER:- The institution caters to the needs of the differently –abled students in the following ways.

- 1) Admission to the differently –abled students is given liberally.
- 2) They are provided with additional books in order to avoid their frequent visits to the college library.
- 3) Financial Facilities available from the government are provided on priority basis.
- 4) Special care is taken to ensure their security, safety and personal dignity.
- 5) Faculty members help such students of lead their life normally.
- 2:2:2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give detailson the process.

ANSWER: The HSC mark sheet with 35% marks is considered as the primary criterion to assess the students' knowledge & skills. In addition to it, at the beginning of academic year some periods are engaged to check students' needs in terms of their knowledge and skills. Taking into consideration these criteria, the students are divided into three categories approximately.

1) Advanced learners -60% & above

- 2) Average learners-46-59%
- 3) Slow learners–Below 45%
- 2:2:3 what are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programmes of their choice? (Bridge / Remedial /Add-on/Enrichment Course etc.)

ANSWER: A brief review of the students' acquaintance in learning is taken and this ensures to bridge up knowledge gap if any and enables the students to cope up with the new course as there is no provision for assessing the students' knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme. However, bridge type (linking lectures) lectures are being engaged at the beginning of actually teaching learning process.

2:2:4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Our institution has co-education system. There are various programmes organized throughout the year formally as well as informally to sensitize its staff and students on issues like gender, inclusion, environment etc. . First, the malefemale ratio of the staff as well as students is satisfactory and as per the rules of statute. Secondly there is common staffroom for male and female staff which helps to keep gender equality .In addition to it Sexual Harassment Prevention committee works actively to keep gender equality by organizing various programmes .In this sense there is unity in diversity.

It is a thing of pride for us to mention that the percentage of girl students is higher than boy students.

To create awareness about environment the university has made 'environment studies' as compulsory subject for B.A/B.com II. It helps students to conserve environment by eradicating its problems. The projects assigned to students are selected taking into consideration local needs to conserve environment. Again every teacher informally discusses about the environmental problems and its ways of eradication in the class whenever there are topics related to the environment. N.S.S unit organizes various programmes like Tree-plantation, Pollution Free River, and Cleaning etc.

2:2:5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational /learning needs of advanced learners?

ANSWER :- Score in the last qualifying exam as well as a brief review of students' talent at the beginning are considered to identify advanced learners. The strategies adopted for advanced learners are as follows.

- 1) Provision of additional books from the college library respective subject teachers.
 - 3. 2) Organization of group discussion, debate, seminar, study tour, contact sessions etc.
 - 4) Distribution of prizes & certificates to meritorious students.
 - 5) Motivating students for uniting articles.
 - 6) Personal guidance.
 - 7) Motivating students for facing competitive examinations.

2:2:6 how does the institute collect analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learner, economically weaker section etc.)?

ANSWER :-During each year, we conduct the pre-semester exams, tests, oral & written tests to collect the data. After collecting the data, the teachers of respective faculty analyze the data to find out slow learners from the analyzed data. For the improvement of slow —learners the faculty members arrange extra lectures, extra coaching classes, remedial classes, special guidance etc.

For the dropout students the respective teachers guide, convince and encourage team to re-appear for the exam through counseling & complete their graduation or post graduation.

For the dropout of girl students there is special attention to girl students. In our experience the girls are found to get married before the completion of graduation or post graduation. In this matter, the teachers of our college meet the concerned in laws of married girls and convince them to complete such girl students' graduation or post- graduation. And it was a noteworthy thing that lots of married girl's students complete their education with good academic record.

2.3. Teaching –Learning Process

ANSWER :- The institution plans and organizes in advance the teaching programme schedules and methodologies.

- 1) The institutional academic calendar is prepared before the commencement of the academic year.
- 2) Each faculty member drafts daily academic diary and adheres to it in teaching learning process in his/her respective subjects.
- 3) Academic calendar & diaries are prepared on the basis of hours of teaching prescribed by the university and number of weekly teaching days.
- 4) Subject wise and teacher wise schedule of tests and assignments are planned and implemented in the institution.
- 5) Evaluation process of the university is being followed in conducting exam and assigning internal marks.
- 6) Central Assessment Programme (CAP) for B.A. /B. Com. is arranged by the college as per the instructions of University.

ANSWER:- IQAC committee plays an effective role in TL process. There are various decisions taken in the bi annual meet of IQAC for effective TL process. The Principal of the college and secretary of parent institution observe the TL process frequently. In additional to it, academic audit is being submitted by IQAC every year.

Whenever required, the college has purchased new reference books, journals for the library as per the recommendations of IQAC.

The college ensures that the students have effective learning experiences. For that, advanced equipment like printers, desktop, televisions, videos, LCD etc. are purchased. The total cost of teaching aids is

ANSWER: - The institution has made very good arrangements for student centered learning by adopting the following strategies?

- i) It organizes bridge type teaching programmes for students before the beginning of actual TL process which helps the students to fill up the gap between students' knowledge & the content to be taught.
- ii) The students' participatory learning activities like seminar, home assessment, project work, session, group discussion, and contact sessions are conducted by the teachers.
- iii) The experiments on learning activities are done by the students in language laboratories under the guidance of respective subject teachers.
- iv) The case studies / problem solving exercises as per the needs of the slow learners & advanced learners are attended specially.
- v) For the benefit of the students, question bank is prepared and supplied to the students to face the examination with confidence in almost all the subjects.
- vi) The department libraries are maintained for the immediate use and reference by the students and teachers.
- vii) The internet facility is provided in the college central library for use the students.
- viii) The library working hours are extended during examination by 2 hours during evening time.

ANSWER:- The college organizes various co- curricular and extracurricular activities to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the student. The cultural committee organizes the following activities.

Students are encouraged to do the computer courses by the college. At the same time students are sent to attend seminars/ workshops organized by other colleges.

ANSWER:-The institution has admission and counseling committee which pays an important or vital role for the new students and stock holders of the college. The committee maintains the profile of the students. All the students get benefit from this committee at the entry & departure level. In addition to it, the committee counsels the students regarding their academic or other problems. At informal level we have collaboration with other counseling centre and career guidance cell which solves the problems at educational domestic, social, economic, professional level.

ANSWER:- Library is considered as the second learning resource which helps to augment the TL process. The college library is equipped with sufficient text and reference books. Sometimes the students are given free access in the library to search for the particular books.

There is departmental library for M.A I & II in English. It helps the teachers and students to have immediate access to the required information .The library have educational C.D collection.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

ANWER:- Yes. Generally all the teachers complete their syllabus within the planned time frame and calendar. However sometimes the teachers participate in an orientation or refresher course for 21 to 28 days. These teachers engage extra periods before or after the participation to the course and complete their syllabi in time. The college takes a special watch on teaching learning process.

The other possible challenges in completing the curriculum are

- 1) Delayed arrival of curriculum from the university
- 2) Non-availability of the prescribed text-books in the market.
- 3) Time consumed in semester exam & assessment work.
- 4) Late results
- 5) Late admissions.

In order to overcome these challenges the faculty members approach directly to BOS members and make available the copy of curriculum .This helps us to forward the syllabus to librarian for placing orders of the prescribed text books and reference books.

Regarding non-availability of text books in time the teachers purchase their own copies or get xeroxed copies of the text books from other sources or approach internet.

It is a fact that with the introduction of semester system a lot of time is being consumed in university examination. This time could have been used for teaching purpose. In order to compensate on it, the faculty members conduct extra lectures or prolonged our regular lectures.

2.3.11 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

ANSWER :- The college has introduced a feedback from the students. The data is collected and analyzed .At the end of a term the meeting of concerned teachers ,HOD & Principal is held & the discussion takes place in respect to the strengths & weaknesses if any and suggestions to overcome it.

The Principal organizes a meeting at the end of each month to review the TL process. The Principal frequently observes the class.

- 4) The results are communicated online to the students by the university. E-marksheets are provided to the students by MKCL. The college displays notices regarding collection of mark sheets.
- 5) The college sends marks for Physical Education and NSS(National Service Scheme)
- 6) The internal assessment marks (Term Work Marks) assigned to the students are displayed on the notice board before sending them to the university.
- 7) Evaluation system followed by the college istransparent.
- 8) Students' result, progress etc. are communicated to the management and parents by the college.
- 9) Discussion regarding students' progress in evaluation takes place in parents meet and management meet.

The secretary of our parent institution Hon.R.R.Lokhande has Ambai Co-Operative Khandasari Project. The college organizes small programmes to render their guidance. In addition to it the students sometimes receive personal guidance from these experts in cotton industries.

Rope is being provided to such students .Secondly, these students are not required to be in queue for office work & library access. They are given first preference. Besides these, students' seating arrangement for disabled students is done at the front side.

First aid box is kept in the porch. Contact number of hospitals, psychiatrists& physiciansin in the city are displayed in the porch. Mamometer, weighing machine, stethoscope, thermameter etc. are also provided by the college. Juice including water, staff, and lemon is always kept ready. In case of emergency, the students are admitted to the health center/hospitals by teacher's vehicle.

The college provides a facility of health insurance for every student enrolled in combination with university.

5) Organizing coaching classes for competitive examinations

Though we don't have formal/ regular coaching classes for competitive examinations there are departments of competitive examinations. The college has a various departments which organize occasional lectures for MPSC, UPSC examinations. In addition to it, there is collaboration between college and other coaching classes for competitive examinations (Snehbandh & Nalanda coaching Academy) in the city. The students are being availed to such classes.

6) Skill development (Spoken English, Computer literary)

In fact we could not start certificate course in spoken English. However every Saturday after college hours are over , the department of English organizes various activities like group discussion ,debate, eloquence etc. to develop students oral skill in English.

Regarding computer literacy the college is shortly starting computer course & recently computer lab is made ready for students.

7) Support for slow learners:

The college teachers organize extra classes for failed students. Such students are given special attention. Extra Books, old question papers, notes etc. are being provided to them on their demand.

8) Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning / corporate/business house etc.

There is facility of M.A in English. Our college is the only college to provide the P.G degree in English in the area of 30 K.M. . So students from other cities also get benefitted by it.

9) Publication of student magazines.

The college publishes a student's magazines every year. To encourage students for creative writing the cultural activity department organizes Poet's Get Together every year. In addition to it, a workshop is being organized by magazine committee which gives guidance for creative writing.

6.1 Institutional vision and leadership

6.1.1 state the vision and mission of the institution, enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc?

Ichalkaranji is one of the important industrial cities in western Maharashtra. It is situated on the bank of river Panchganga. The people residing here come (migrate) from other states like Karnataka, Gujrat, Rajastan, Bihar etc.. . As a result of it, there is variety of castes, class, religion etc. Majority of these people belong to poor & middle class. Their main objective was to search for source of income. Such families belong to socially deprived class. Mr. Jaywant Awale, the then state minster for social welfare started Jaywantrao Awale Propagatary Board in 1986 .It's main vision was to provide &spread higher education among the sons & daughters of textile mill workers, farm laborers, industrial workers as well as to poor, needy and economically & intellectually weaker students. There are four branches of the present institution which provides education from higher secondary school to PG.

- a) The vision and mission of the institution are in tune with the avowed objectives of the national higher educational policy & UGC. They take care of social development, personality development of students, use to ICT in TL process and developing competency among the students.
- b) The institution through its academic and curricular & extra curricular programmes translates its vision & mission statement into its activities.
- 6.1.2: What is the role of top management, Principal and faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The management itself involves in the overall development of the institution .It works in terms of

1) To provide infrastructure:

The management takes initiatives to provide necessary infrastructure in the form of buildings, laboratories, class rooms, library facilities, sport facilities etc. its' repairing and maintainance.

2) Recruitment:

The management recruits the necessary staff as per the norms of UGC and government of Maharashtra and statute of Shivaji University.

3) Healthy Atmosphere:

The management encourages its staff to improve their qualification. As a result of it 90 % of teaching faculty is either M.Phil/Ph.D research degree holder. It provides freedom to take their own decision for the betterment of faculty and students.

4) Decentralization:

To make academic and administrative process smooth the management has established LMC (local Management Committee).

5) Correlation:

The head of the institution is the main kingpin between management and faculty. He holds meeting with various faculties time to time and checks the performance after reviewing analysis of feedback by students and gives instructions for improvement of quality. The information collected is broadly analyzed and informed by him to the management.

6) Review of academic progress:

The head of the institution communicates regarding faculty's academic progress. Through these, management initiates its own plans for effective and efficient transaction of the teaching learning process.

6.1.3: what is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

- A) The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission:

Following action plans are taken for the fulfillment of stated missions and vision:

1) Preparation of perspective plan:

Every year at the end of academic year, the parent institution holds a meeting to set perspective plans for the upliftment of deprived society in and around Ichalkaranji.

- 2) The campus of college is deliberately selected, majority of neighborhood community belong to poor, socially deprived, educationally &economically weaker section. For Instance, there isMHADA colony near the college campus. It is the colony of migrated families. They are small scale industrial workers. Their children are benefited of higher education provided by us.
- 3) At short distance there is a garment park established by chairman of our institution Hon. Mr. Sanjayji Awale . Majority of workers, their sons- daughters are availed of the UG and PG degree course provided by our college..
- 4) The chairman of our parent institution Mr. Sanjay Awale contested municipal corporation election & was elected for two times. Moreover, he remained mayor (president) of Ichalkanraji. He is aware about the need of higher education among workers. It is his intention to provide higher education toatleast a member in such families. The members of management interact individually with these families.
- 5) There are 4-5 junior colleges at the distance of 1.50 to 2 km. But for degree Education College the students have to travel at least 5-6 km. Due to inconvenience majority of students especially girls had to drop their education out. The college proved convenient for such students. There is decrease in drop out of such students. Even the college felt its need to start commerce faculty and PG centre. Both the faculties are in full swing.

- 6) There is an informal demand of community to start certificate courses in spoken English and computer application.
 - A) 1) It is the policy of management that every student, appeared for admission, should be admitted. So merit list is not required .The minimum qualification for seeking admission is to qualify in the previous class.
 - 2) Students belonging to backward community is given admission at price of Rs.10 only.
 - 3) Themanagement suggested providing an opportunity to submit their fees in to two installments.
 - 4) The Principal constitutes various committees for smooth academic and administrative process.
 - 5) The management takes review of these committees time to time.

C) Interaction with stakeholder:-

- 1) The members of management are natives. The founder president of parent institution Mr. Jayawantraoji Awale is remained MLA for 4 times from Hatkanangale Constituency. His family is also involved actively for the upliftment of deprived society. In addition to it, his activists themselves are the stakeholders. So, they have a direct relation with the management.
- 2) The management through Principal takes review of various committees time to time.
- 3) The management & head of the institution communicate time to time through various meetings. The academic performance to teachers is analyzed and discussed and instructions are given for quality enhancement.
- 4) The management holds meeting of students and try to understand their problems & grievances if there are.
- 5) The alumni meet the management and discuss the performances of the college.

6.1.4: what are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

Though there is not a separate committee to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution, there are member of other committees which successfully looks and considers the issues concerned above time to time. LMC committee, standing committee, student's council, IQAC etc. are the major committees to monitor & evaluate the policies implement by the college. Theses committee discuss the various policies implemented time to time and there effective implementation.

The institutional leadership always motivates the faculty for academic development. As a part of it, the top management always motivates academic experts by appointing them as a membership in the management. There are three members representing teaching faculty in LMC. In addition to it prof. D.U.Pawar & Prof. Bhalba Vibhute who are the academic experts in Shivaji University are the members of LMC. Besides, top management organizes academic audit every year. All these personalities provide academic leadership.

Institutional development is a decentralized process. To achieve institutional visions and goals in a proper way, leadership is divided into curricular, extracurricular, co-curricular, sports and administrative levels. The college forms various committees to groom leadership at various levels. These committees include students, teaching faculties, as well as administrative staff. The head of the institution holds time to time meeting with these committees to view proper working of these committees. At the end of academic year, annual report of all the committees is collected and analyzed & meetings are hold to evaluate its progress & implementation.


